Waterbeach Barracks The story so far

In February 2014, the Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) started a process to find a development partner for the former military brownfield land. By August 2014 Urban&Civic had been selected and subsequently took over the management and promotion of the site.

In parallel to this, South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council are in the process of preparing new Local Plans to cover the period 2011-2031. The Local Plans look at how the local area can deliver the housing it needs (33,000 homes) up until 2031. The proposed Local Plan allocates DIO's land, together with adjoining land to the north and east, as a strategic development site – a new settlement which it refers to as 'Waterbeach New Town.' Following consultation on issues and options in 2012 and 2013, the proposed submission Local Plan was published for public consultation between July and September 2013 and was submitted to the Secretary of State for independent examination in March 2014. The Examination in Public opened in November 2014 and is on-going. Whilst it is currently paused, it is due to restart next year.

Most recently the community has agreed a Neighbourhood Plan area with South Cambs which extends to the full Parish boundary and includes the strategic development site. The Neighbourhood Plan will be developed by a Working Group in parallel with the Local Plan process and our engagement and masterplanning work.



We've been listening

There has been much discussion over the future of the Barracks and former airfield in recent years and since our appointment we have been focussing on three things:

- Understanding every inch of the 716 acre site:
- Seeing how we can open up some of the facilities again to local people
- Listening to key local concerns and priorities and ensuring we bring them into the process to evolve the right plans for the site.

We have developed an engagement strategy with the input of the Parish Council, Neighbourhood Plan working group and the District Council and by drawing on our experience of collaborative planning approaches. This will provide a range of opportunities for people to get involved in general discussions about the development; specific discussions on themes such as education, landscape, drainage and transport; as well as to work with the team on solutions and future plans.

First steps

Working with the Parish Council, Urban&Civic have looked at a number of projects which include:

- use of the Gym and Squash Courts
- reopening of the Military Heritage Museum
 refurbishment and access to the
- Memorial Garden
- potential use of the lakes for fishing and amenity
- expansion of the village cemetery into Barracks land
- links to Denny Abbey and the historic well head.

We have secured planning consent for a number of the facilities on site to come back into community use, including the sports hall, the squash courts, tennis courts and a set of community rooms, part of which will house the re-instated Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum.

The airfield's iconic Control Tower is also being refurbished to be used as offices and meeting space for the Urban&Civic team and should be open by Christmas.

Tim Leathes, Development Director for Urban&Civic, said: "We had a strong message from our neighbours, the Parish Council and community groups, that people wanted to have access to some of the facilities enjoyed when the Barracks was open, and while we have not managed to bring all of them back at this stage, it will be great to see the site back in use."
