

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Hello and welcome to the Winter edition of our newsletter, which provides an update of all the work the team and our partners have been progressing, and the things to look out for in future months.

With the northern part of Phase 1 underway, and further housebuilders due to join Cala and Stonebond on site in the coming months, the Urban&Civic team has started to prepare land to the east of the lake for the next homes. Work is also due to start on the new pedestrian, cycle and equestrian bridge over the A10, which will connect the new development to Cambridge via the upgraded Mere Way.

With Stonebond and Cala's new homes being delivered, and new housebuilders due to be announced in the coming months, we share information in this newsletter about the Discount Market Sale apartments currently available, along with other ways to live at Waterbeach.

As we welcome new families, we continue to work with Cambridgeshire County Council to deliver the primary school. There is currently capacity in Waterbeach Community Primary School and we are working with the school and new residents to ensure safe and easy access for new residents.

In this edition we share the latest sustainable travel initiatives from smart journeys and an update from the Greater Cambridge Partnership on new transport projects to significantly improve people's journeys along the A10 corridor.

We also share some of the work we are doing to create and enhance habitats for nature in the northern park planned for the development, an update from Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum and look at some of our recent sporting, creative and cultural events and activities.

For those setting New Year Resolutions on health and wellbeing, Waterbeach is hosting a Community Wellbeing Fair from 11am to 2pm on Sunday, 19 January in The Studio. This will give residents and those living in the area a chance to try some of the regular sports and fitness classes taking place at the development and locally before signing up for regular sessions. Around Waterbeach

Site preparation works

With the northern part of Phase 1 moving forward, and further housebuilders due to join Cala and Stonebond on site in the coming months, the Urban&Civic team has started to prepare land to the east of the lake for the next 269 homes being delivered in Phase 1.

Contractors are currently undertaking a series of earthworks across 22.5 acres, to prepare the ground for infrastructure including roads, footpaths and cycleways, and a pocket park alongside the next homes

Paul Mumford, Project Director for the Waterbeach development, said: "This work is an important next step for the project, as this second part of Phase 1 starts to connect the new homes north of the lake back to the village, and will start the delivery of the permanent Causeway. In time, this active travel link will replace the temporary pedestrian and cycle way that currently follows the bus connection between the village and the new homes."

Work is also taking place to the north of the current homes to create the next phase of sustainable drainage, which will improve flood resilience for the new development by holding water until it is gradually released back into the ground. These ponds will also provide important new habitats for nature.

As part of Urban&Civic's sustainability commitment to reuse and recycle materials on site, earth produced from these works will be used to create the embankments that will support the bridge over the A10.





Work starts on new A10 bridge

Work is due to start on the new pedestrian, cycle and equestrian bridge over the A10 that will connect the new Waterbeach development to the work carried out to upgrade Mere Way: providing a direct largely off-road connection from the new homes to Cambridge Science Park, Regional College and on to the city. The route beyond the bridge has also been updated to work with and connect most effectively to the new Park&Ride and busway being brought forward by the Greater Cambridge Partnership.

Archaeological investigations have been completed, and the first phase of work on-site is expected to start in the spring. This will see the construction of embankments and the installation of vehicle safety barriers to enable the construction team to work safely by the A10 carriageway.

This will be followed by diverting existing utilities in the area, and creating the structural supports for the bridge to be lifted into place in four sections and welded together.

The majority of work will take place away from the carriageway or off-site and minimal disruption is anticipated to users of the A10. Advance notice will be given of any traffic management required to ensure the safety of construction workers and road users during the installation of the bridge.

Paul Mumford said: "The new A10 bridge is an important piece in the jigsaw of our sustainable transport strategy, making sustainable travel between Waterbeach, the Science Park and Cambridge City Centre a viable option for people living and working in the area — now and in the future. It's great to see it reach this important milestone."

The bridge, which was designed in consultation with key user groups, was granted planning permission in Spring 2022. Construction, however, was paused whilst the Urban&Civic team worked with Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) to review updating the alignment of the northern section of the Mere Way route to work most effectively with the new Park and Ride and busway scheme.

The investment into the bridge forms part of a package of sustainable and active travel improvements by the Waterbeach development including Mere Way upgrades, investment in bus services and a new sustainable travel hub that sits at the gateway of the development. Work on the first phase of Mere Way upgrade works have been completed, and the installation of the new A10 bridge will be accompanied by installing the connection from the bridge to the upgraded Mere Way route — final details of which are still being worked through with GCP.

The construction process and installation are expected to take 12 months and, based on the current timeline, the new bridge is due to open in early 2026.

Discount Market Sale apartments

A key part of the discussions during the consultation on plans for Waterbeach was the need for people to have homes that they and their children can afford to live in so they can stay in the local area.

As part of the planning process, Urban&Civic worked with the South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) Housing team to ensure there will be opportunities for local people, and people with links to the village, to buy a property in the new development.

One such opportunity is Discount Market Sale (DMS), which is available on selected 1, 2 and 3 bedroom apartments from Stonebond and Cala.

DMS is a government-backed affordable home ownership scheme that enables the purchase of a new home at a 20% discount from the local market value.

Through the scheme, 100% of the property is owned by the purchaser and will remain discounted through its lifetime — which means that when sold, the 20% discount of the market value will be passed on to the next eligible buyer.

The focus for the scheme is people with a connection to Waterbeach, and with the history of the Barracks, it also provides opportunities for members of the Armed Forces looking to set down roots in the area.

SCDC has set out the eligibility criteria for purchasing a DMS home at Waterbeach.

The Qualifying Buyer criteria includes:

- 1 You are a first time buyer.
- You have a direct local connection to Waterbeach village through work (in paid employment for the last 12 months for 16 hours or more per week, or have a formal offer of permanent employment). You have lived in Waterbeach village for at least five years out of the last eight years or you have family members (parents, children or siblings) who have been living in Waterbeach village for at least five years. There are special circumstances that give rise to a local connection to Waterbeach village, for example where the applicant's substantive role is as a carer to a person resident in the village.

- 3 You are a member of the Armed Forces
- 4 You are a resident of South Cambridgeshire selling an existing home and unable to afford to buy a suitably sized, appropriate market property that meets your needs in the same area as the DMS home you're interested in.

In addition, the following Eligibility & Affordability Criteria must be met:

- Household earnings below £80,000.
- You cannot afford to pay more than 80% of the market value of the property.
- A mortgage for at least 50% of the discount market price must be obtained.
- No financial interest in any other property.
- This must be your main or only residence.
- You must be able to legally own a home in the UK.
- You must not have more than 50% of the discounted sale price in equity/savings/gifted deposit unless you are vulnerable and have a disability.

Application process

Step 1: Choose your DMS home.

Step 2: To apply, you will need to be financially qualified by an Independent Financial Adviser who will ensure you've met the eligibility criteria and collect the evidence needed. This is free of charge.

Step 3: Once you have been financially qualified, you can reserve your new home and pay the £2,000 reservation fee.

Step 4: The legal team at your housebuilder will then be in touch with your solicitor who will receive all the relevant information, eligibility criteria and contracts.

Affordable housing at Waterbeach

Amplius (formerly Longhurst Group) is working with Cala Homes and Stonebond to offer a collection of one, two and three-bedroom properties and initial shares can be bought in stages and range from 25 percent up to 75 percent depending on the lease.

Results have been positive, with Shared Ownership customers already beginning their moving journey to new homes.

When the time is right, there is also an opportunity to staircase and buy additional shares in your home and, if your lease allows, you can purchase the Freehold interest to own your home outright.

To support Shared Ownership opportunities at Waterbeach, Amplius' 'Moving Made Easier' provides an allowance towards moving costs to help the journey to home ownership more accessible and provide the extra support needed to take that first step onto the property ladder.



Connections

Waterbeach has been designed to encourage a healthy, sustainable lifestyle, with the right infrastructure and services being put in place for people to lead low carbon lives as the development rolls out.

The Urban&Civic team is working with smart journeys, the Sustainable Travel Planning Team hosted by Cambridgeshire County Council, to help deliver a place that puts walking and cycling first and encourages people to leave their car at home.

smart journeys will support residents with a range of sustainable travel options — including walking, cycling, car sharing and making effective use of the local bus services. Recent cycling initiatives at Waterbeach included a bike safety event at Waterbeach Transport Hub with free servicing and repairs as well as free bike lights for residents to support safe cycling during the winter months.

smart journeys has also carried out a travel survey to find out more about travel choices of people living and working on the development, and gain a better understanding of the barriers that prevent commuters from using more sustainable modes of transport. The data collected will help influence future transport decisions and public transport improvements across the local area. It will also be used to inform future travel incentives smart journeys offer to residents at the new development. This survey will be repeated annually to ensure the travel plans and incentives are informed by those who are living in Waterbeach.



Other sustainable travel initiatives operating at Waterbeach include:



App Bikes are available at the Sustainable Transport Hub, at the gateway to the development, by the Studio and outside the squash courts. Further locations and bikes

will be rolled out as the development continues. They are available for anyone to use, you just need to download the free App, register and get pedalling. Don't forget to take a bike helmet with you and ride responsibly. Urban&Civic is funding the first 45 minutes of each hire, after which it costs £1 for every 30 minutes.



Liftshare support new and existing residents in the area to car share as the driver, passenger or both. As more members join, more potential matches will be available. It's a great

way to save money, reduce CO₂ emissions and reduce stress. Download the Liftshare Companion App and join your community: search for 'Urban&Civic' and click to join the Waterbeach community. Alternatively, find out more and sign up at www.waterbeach.liftshare.com.

Plans are progressing for a new **Shuttlebus** service to be available in the spring. In the meantime, the current free taxi service that allows residents to access the train station for peak commuting trains will continue.

Strategic transport update from the GCP

New transport projects to significantly improve people's journeys along the A10 corridor have been progressed by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP).

The GCP is progressing three projects to provide frequent and reliable public transport journeys from Waterbeach New Town to Cambridge city centre, connecting people to education and key employment sites.

Waterbeach to Cambridge

Plans for a new busway and travel hub to connect Waterbeach, Landbeach and Cambridge have progressed. The scheme includes a maintenance track alongside the busway to be used as a new walking and cycling route.

The GCP will shortly be asking Cambridgeshire County Council — the highways authority — to submit a Transport & Works Act Order (TWAO) application to the Government for permission to build the new busway.

Waterbeach Greenway

The scheme will provide new and improved walking, cycling and — where appropriate — equestrian links between Cambridge and villages to the north of the city, as well as links to employment sites and public transport hubs. It is one of 12 greenway routes in development.

In October 2023, the GCP held a consultation on the newly proposed alignment which follows a route behind the A10 and through Milton village. The revised route for the northern section of the Waterbeach Greenway was approved by the GCP's Executive Board this autumn. Further work with local stakeholders will be undertaken to develop the proposals through Milton. Improvements to Cowley Road, which forms part of the greenway, are already underway.


Waterbeach Station relocation

The GCP is also supporting the relocation of Waterbeach Station, which will come forward as part of the Eastern side of the development of the New Town. The board agreed the business case and an increased budget of £43.35m to cover the cost of the new station and a new haul road — which will use the existing construction entrances and routes for the Barracks side of the development and then construct new connections across to the station location. This additional funding will be provided by Homes England, with a grant of up to £23.35m released to forward fund the projects.

Cllr Elisa Meschini, chair of the Greater Cambridge Partnership said: "These projects are vital to the future of not just Waterbeach but to the region as a whole. If I look at the new busway, not only will it offer local residents a fast, efficient public transport route into Cambridge, it gives people from further along the A10 corridor like Ely, access to a travel hub and a segregated bus service, which will get them into the city far quicker than staying on heavily congested roads.

"We are looking to give people alternatives to needing to drive but these alternatives must get you to where you want to go and must be interconnected. So our mission is to make sure existing residents and those yet to move to Waterbeach in the years to come have the facilities and ability to travel in a way which meets their needs. These three projects allow us to do just that."

Nature

Creating and enhancing habitats

In the Autumn 2023 edition of the Waterbeach newsletter we introduced the five key habitat areas within the development that will protect and enhance ecology at Waterbeach. In Winter 2023 we highlighted the lake and runway grasslands and in Spring 2024 we focused on the former golf course. In this edition we take a closer look at the northern park.

The northern park

The northern park has small areas of rough grassland along the margins and areas of scattered trees and hedgerows. This area will become a large-scale habitat creation area along the northern boundary of the site. This will allow for links to existing fields and fenland to the north and connections to the other biodiversity priority areas (the former golf course area to the east and the western bund, which we will feature in the next edition of the newsletter).

This area will focus largely on habitat creation, converting the existing arable fields to species-rich grasslands and parklands with peripheral wetland areas.

Within this area, existing species rich grassland will be retained and enhanced, complementing and connecting to the habitats created for newts along the eastern side of the site. A number of other species will also benefit from this large expanse of rich grassland including lizards, butterflies, moths, bats and birds. Open areas will also be available for farmland birds such as skylark, meadow pipit and yellowhammer as well as small mammals such as brown hares.

Grassland focused habitats will support local priority habitats and species and complement adjacent farmland habitats to the north. Public use will be managed to ensure sensitive ecological areas remain undisturbed, such as areas for ground nesting bird species. Planting trees and scrub species belts within this area will provide foraging opportunities for species such as badger and bats.

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The amazing landscape and species that made the old barracks their home have always been a fundamental part of the vision for this new part of Waterbeach.

Safeguarding and enhancing these spaces for nature is a huge part of ensuring nature thrives in homes and habitats alongside the new community, achieving over 20% net gain of space for nature throughout the development.

Brown hares and barn owls are two of the focus species for the northern park habitat area at Waterbeach.

Brown hares

Brown hares live in grasslands and woodland edges, especially where these habitats meet arable fields and hedgerows. They graze on plants and bark and make use of shallow dips in the ground or grass for shelter instead of burrows.

Brown hares are a protected species in the UK. Weighing around 2-5kg and reaching speeds up to 45mph, their larger size, long legs and long black-tipped ears set them apart from rabbits (of which there are many in the UK!). During the breeding season in early spring, brown hares can be seen 'boxing', when females ward off unwanted male attention.

These owls have a white belly and heart-shaped face with golden-buff coloured back and wings. They feed on mice, rats and voles. Conservation efforts since the 90s allowed the UK population of barn owl to recover enough to be moved from Amber to Green conservation status in 2015.

Barn owls can be seen year-round at dusk and dawn. Look out for them hunting from fence posts or in low flight over farmland and hedgerows. Male barn owls may be heard screeching in the early breeding season and owl chicks can be heard hissing for their next feed in the evenings.

Heritage

Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum update

Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum (WMHM), which is located at the Denny End Road entrance of the development, tells the story of the former airfield: from 1938 when the land was bought and the RAF arrived, to the handover to the Royal Engineers stationed here from 1966 until 2012.

The Museum has an impressive collection of artefacts and memorabilia on Waterbeach Barracks and Airfield – and the men and women who served there – many of which have been donated by family and friends of those stationed at the airfield.

Stone carving of iconic image unveiled

'The Return', a stone carving depicting the crew of RAF 514 Squadron's Lancaster bomber returning home to Waterbeach after a mission, is currently on display at WMHM.

This unique carving created by artist Gordon Hayes portrays an iconic moment captured by a press photographer taken over 80 years ago, when the crewmen returned following a daylight raid on 14 October 1944.

The carving, which was unveiled by Wing Commander John Grenville, Station Commander at RAF Wyton on 30 November 2024, is currently on loan. The team at WMHM is hoping to raise £13,000 to retain the carving at the Museum in memory of all the people who gave their lives flying or serving in Waterbeach in the RAF or Royal Engineers.

Exploring the Museum

Four new glass cabinets have recently been purchased with grants from Urban&Civic, Waterbeach Parish Council and Waterbeach Community Association. These are being used in the RAF area of the Museum to enable more of the collection to be displayed and the Royal Engineers area to be extended.

A collection of model Lancaster Bombers made by Derek Abbot, a Royal Observer Corps member of over 50 years, have been donated and the Museum is hoping to display them in formation overhead, together with sound recordings.

In addition to the Lancasters flown by 514 Squadron, many different types of aircraft flew from Waterbeach between 1941 and 1966. Displays are being created for each RAF Squadron stationed at Waterbeach and the Royal Engineers area will be a focus for the WMHM team in 2025.

More space has also been created for the interactive elements of Duxford Radio Trust's exhibit. A replica wireless operator's position installed on a Lancaster Bomber gives visitors a rare insight into communications tools available during World War 2, including the early radar and directional finding equipment used on the military base. There is also a Morse Key for visitors to practice on; with children earning a certificate if they can spell out their names in Morse Code!



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We look forward to welcome more new residents to Waterbeach, so they can learn about the heritage of the former RAF Station, Royal **Engineer Barracks and training** grounds that covered the area of where they are now living.

Supporting New Communities Conference

An Engaging New and Emerging Communities Conference was held in October, which brought together around 80 participants from various sectors. This included local authorities, faith groups, charities, developers and community development professionals alongside residents from new communities in Cambridgeshire like Waterbeach.

The event was organised by Cambridgeshire County Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council with support from Urban&Civic and focused on fostering a sense of community in large-scale developments.

The conference explored some of the challenges of supporting new residents moving into new places to create vibrant communities; delivering early facilities and meanwhile uses to support them; and working with neighbouring communities to build connections between individuals, groups and communities.

Keynote speaker Cormac Russell spoke about the need to both support new residents while still empowering them to shape the new place coming forward around them. Attendees also discussed the challenge and opportunity of bringing local people into sometimes complex discussions within planning, local government, health and education institutions.

Other key considerations during the event were the importance of nurturing community ties, governance and community engagement in new communities, the voice of young people in creating spaces and places, and uses of land until development comes forward.

Cllr Brian Milnes, Deputy Leader and Lead Cabinet Member for Environment, said: "South Cambridgeshire District Council recognises that in order for a new community to be a great place to live, we need to create the conditions for a thriving, resilient community with which new residents can connect.

"This conference was an invaluable opportunity to hear from all those involved in creating these conditions, from planners and developers to councillors and, most importantly, local residents: to explore together how we can do this, from the very earliest stages in the planning process, continuing through construction phases and early occupations, and as developments mature to form new communities.

"If we can harness the energy and ideas of residents, building on their strengths, each place can develop its own distinctive character and identity where people feel a strong sense of community."



CamSAR Community Training

Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue (CamSAR) is a member of Lowland Rescue and provides the Cambridgeshire Constabulary with a specially trained emergency team of volunteers from across the county (including Waterbeach) in the search for vulnerable high-risk missing persons.



To assist with its searches, CamSAR can deploy various specialist resources including foot, bike, drone, medical and dog teams and those specially trained for water-based searches. It regularly undertakes searches for the police using its own radio communications, search equipment, IT and planning and mapping tools as well as full welfare support.

In September, some of the CamSAR team came out to the lake in Waterbeach to help raise awareness of water safety with the local community and provided some practical hands-on training, which included rescuing team members from the bank using rescue throw ropes like those placed around the lake.

They also returned in November to facilitate navigation and water safety training for the Cambridgeshire Army Cadets, who are based in Waterbeach Village.

Barry Carter, Chair and one of the Search Managers at CamSAR, said: "Sessions at locations like those around Waterbeach lake provide valuable opportunities for us. We can run many training scenarios and exercises in the types of environment that the team readily finds itself in on real callouts. Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue has existed for over 18 years and within this time has located many missing persons and helped many families. The charity has to find its own funding wherever it can and is 100% operated by volunteers.



"The work we do demands that we are able to provide a professional and highly skilled specialist search team for the police 24/7/365. The team also regularly fulfils a civil contingencies role to Cambridgeshire, such as in times of adverse weather like evacuating care homes in flooding or even helping to deliver food and PPE to the vulnerable that were isolating during the pandemic."

Swim, Bike, Run

Trust to host a couple of free family Swim,
Bike, Run events. The course, which made
the most of Waterbeach's beautiful lake —
with a 100m swim, a 2km bike loop and a
1.3km run — was off road and suitable for
children and complete beginners as well
as experienced athletes.

Supported by Paris Inspired British Triathlon funding, which helps develop active communities during and after the Olympics, the Swim, Bike, Run events were a fun, informal way to give triathlon a go, with participants invited to complete as many loops of the course as they wanted, or skip out a discipline altogether.

Waterbeach resident, Ratna, said: "It was truly amazing to participate in this event with my son. We had a fantastic time. The beautiful lake and the cycling track made the experience very special, and the warm and encouraging atmosphere made it both memorable and motivational."


Christmas by the lake
